HARKEN

The Unfolding Story

If you look closely, you will see Harken furlers, blocks and travelers on just about all of our boats. Harken, located in Pewaukee, WI, and makers of some of the most drool worthy sailing gear on the planet, has long been a special contributor to the Sailing Center. We would especially like to express our appreciation to Harken for their donation of a Harken ESP Jib Reefing and Furling unit for Reliance, our C&C 29. If you aren't familiar with the model, there's a reason: The Harken ESP is a new product line.

Harken employees Neil Evans, Technical Service, and Tom Hanks, Hydraulics/ Controls Engineer and MCSC member, came out the first day to cut and install a new forestay for the



boat. Then they installed the furling unit over the forestay, and with Jared Drake's help, stepped the 44 foot long mast. The next day Jim Bourne, Technical Service, and Greg Hartimeier, Senior Engineer for Special Products, tested the new product with a multitude of furling lines of different diameters and compositions. It was one of their first opportunities to test the unit on an older boat and it passed with flying colors. The new furler turns freely over the forestay and, combined with the larger diameter furling line drum, when the wind kicks up the new unit reels in a big genny like a dream.

TCF Bank Milwaukee Air Expo

The Blue Angels, the U.S. Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron, will soar in the skies over Milwaukee on July 16 and 17 during the TCF Bank Milwaukee Air Expo. The Blue Angels are returning to Milwaukee for the first time in 6 years and will be headlining the air show. They are in great demand - Each December The Department of Defense



decides which requests to grant from hundreds of air shows all over the country. This year Milwaukee was a lucky winner.

The Blue Angels will be performing last at each day's show, but the afternoon will be filled with other flying demonstrations. Each show will start with military fly-bys and continue with the Army Special Forces

The free show will be centered over the War Memorial and Veterans Park. American Air Shows, which is putting on the event, expects Lakefront attendance of 250,000 people.


What's all this got to do with sailing? Sailing will be restricted. There

History of the Ensign

The 22.5-foot, fiberglass sloop was first built by Pearson Yachts in 1962, as the Electra Day sailer, and as may be guessed from the name, was really a re-design of an earlier boat. In 1959, Pearson commissioned naval architect Carl Alberg to design a 22-foot cruiser suitable for racing. His design, called the Electra, had a masthead rig, a small, self-bailing cockpit, and a cabin with galley space, a head and bunks. About 350 Electras were built over the next six years.

But Pearson dealers found that many prospective Electra buyers would prefer the boat with a larger cockpit and smaller cabin. They passed the information along to Pearson, who subsequently asked Alberg to design a day sailer, suitable for onedesign racing, based on the Electra hull.

The Electra Day sailer seemed a popular boat from the start: Pearson sold 219 of them in 1962, their first year, despite only one racing fleet having been formed that year. The next year saw 213 more boats built and nine more fleets formed.

Over the years, a total of 66 fleets were formed. Fleets grew on the coasts, lakes and rivers, even on reservoirs. They showed up in the places you would expect, such as the West Coast, the Great Lakes, and all down the East Coast. But fleets also formed in places you might not consider keelboat waters; places like The Dillon Reservoir in Colorado, nearly 9,000 feet above sea level; the Finger Lakes; and Lake Winnipesaukee.

The class association is largely responsible for the Ensign remaining a simple boat. "In general, we tried to keep the family boating advantages of the craft," recalled John M. O'Connell, a Pearson dealer from New Hampshire and 1964 Ensign National Champion, "while at the same time ensuring the quality of racing. It came up that nearly everyone hated the name Electra Day sailer. We came up with the name Ensign."

Sailing the Ensign to its potential does not require any techniques that are peculiar to the boat. But it does have to be sailed for what it is, "basically a little big boat," according to Clark Thompson, Jr.

the first person to win the nationals twice in two successive years. "It is heavy and requires time to reach full speed. Accordingly, it carries a great deal of headway. These and other similar characteristics," he continues, "result in two primary objectives when racing: keep it flat and keep it moving."
